Homework Policy

Introduction

This policy was drawn up as a result of whole staff collaboration, with the Board of Management and Parents' Association to ensure that homework is a positive and productive experience, which enhances the child's learning.

Rationale: Why give homework?

- a) To consolidate and re-enforce what the child learns in school.
- b) To provide a link between teacher and parent, and promote partnership between home and school in supporting a child's learning.
- c) To develop concentration, good study habits / skills and independent learning.

When is homework given?

Homework is given from Monday to Thursday, and normally not at weekends. There are some exceptions:

- If homework has been neglected consistently during the week.
- In senior classes, project work may be undertaken at weekends.
- In rare occasions homework may be given on Fridays if the class has not performed well in the lining up competition during the previous month.
- Sometimes children are given "homework off" as a treat or as acknowledgement of some special occasion.

How long Should Homework Take?

Different children will complete the same homework in different lengths of time, depending on the child's abilities, levels of focus and concentration, distractions, conditions in which homework is completed, time of the year etc. It is the quality and not the quantity of the homework that matters.

During the month of June there will be no written homework in so far as possible.

Active Homework may be given on your child's PE day.

The following are general guidelines only:

- Junior Infants Up to 10 minutes
- Senior Infants Up to 15 minutes
- 1st Class Up to 20 minutes
- 2nd Class Up to 25 minutes
- 3rd Class Up to 30 minutes
- 4th Class Up to 40 minutes
- 5th Class Up to 50 minutes

• 6th Class Up to 1 hour

Types of homework usually given:

The following are just some of the types of homework that may be given across the class levels:

- Shared Reading / Library Reading
- Spellings Learning and written work
- Learning of tables
- Learning of songs / poems / prayers
- Written assignments
- Mathematics questions
- Project Work
- Bringing in items connected with particular subjects / topics e.g. historical artefacts
- Interviewing parents / grandparents / family on particular topics 'Active' homework

Children with Special Education Needs

Homework is differentiated, when necessary, to ensure that children with special educational needs are accommodated. Children who attend Special Education Teacher (SET) may get additional or alternative homework, after consultation with parents and Class teacher. (E.g. alternative spellings etc.)

Special consideration is made to ensure that any such child would not be overburdened with an extra work load. In some cases, homework given by the class teacher may be reduced for an individual child to compensate homework given by a SET.

How much help should parents give?

Parents should help by:

- Providing a suitable place and time to do homework.
- Encourage their child to do their best and try each item of homework.
- By giving a simple explanation only when a child is having difficulty. Parents should not do the homework.
- Writing a note to the teacher explaining the problem.
- Enjoying shared reading with their child.
- Helping with Spellings, Tables etc.

How often should parents monitor homework?

- Parents should check and sign a child's homework journal every evening. Parents may be also asked to sign tests, to ensure they are informed of their child's progress.
- The school Homework Journal (1st. 6th. Classes) is an important record of homework and a valuable means of communication between parents and teachers.
- Please ensure that your child uses his/her homework journal every night and ticks each item when completed.

• Please check your child's journal for notes on a regular basis.

How often do teachers monitor homework?

Teachers should ensure that all homework set is prepared and explained well, and is at the right level for the class. Additionally teachers should ensure that all homework set is corrected. The frequency of this may vary:

Ideally, teachers like to check homework on a regular (daily) basis, when time allows.

As children get older and learn to work independently, some items of homework are checked less often, e.g. every second day/once a week.

Some homework is corrected orally and checked by the children themselves, under the direction of the teacher. This can be a useful part of the learning process for children.

When should parents communicate with teachers about homework?

- a) When a child cannot do homework due to family circumstances.
- b) When a child cannot understand some aspect.
- c) If the time spent at homework is often longer than the recommended time. If homework is not completed, and no written explanation is provided, or if homework is not completed to the best of the child's ability, the teacher may decide to re-assign this homework for completion at another time. (E.g. lunchtime / another night / weekend)

When pupils are absent:

Parents should notify the school when a child is absent, or is due to be absent, for any reason.

- a) If the child is well enough, homework can be provided by the class teacher, to be completed at home.
- b) Otherwise, when the child returns to school, every effort should be made to ensure that he has not fallen behind.

When should homework be done?

Ideally, soon after school, before television is watched. Each family situation is different, however and working parents may need to check homework later. Homework should never be left until morning time before school.

PLEASE REMEMBER:

If homework is a stressful experience between parent and child, something is wrong!

This can lead to poor learning and defeats the whole purpose. Should this happen on a regular basis, please contact the class teacher.

Implementation, Review & Communication

This policy adopted by the Board of Management on <u>30 January 2019</u>. It is monitored and reviewed once every three years, or sooner if necessary. It is available to view on the school website and through the office in the school.
